Who will be able to get a COVID-19 Vaccine?

Eventually there will be enough vaccine for everyone who lives in San Mateo County, and we are laying the foundation now to make access as easy as possible.

Because initial vaccine supplies are limited, the federal government has created guidance, which California has further detailed for who will receive the vaccine and in what order.



Who is able to get a COVID-19 Vaccine now?

The first groups to receive vaccines are:

- Healthcare Workers
 - Healthcare workers (clinical and non-clinical) providing direct healthcare and at-risk of COVID-19 exposure
 - Medical First Responders (paramedics, EMTs)



- Adults 65 and older with underlying health condition and/or a disability
- o Essential workers in:
 - transportation and logistics
 - industrial/residential/commercial sectors
 - critical manufacturing
- Incarcerated individuals
- Homeless/unhoused individuals

SUBJECT: CDPH Allocation Guidelines for COVID-19 Vaccine During Phase 1A: Recommendations

Recommendation A: Populations for Phase 1a

During Phase 1a of allocation, COVID-19 vaccine should be of ered to the following persons in California:

 Persons at risk of exposure to SARS-CoV-2 through their work in any role in direct health care or long-term care settings.

o This population includes persons at direct risk of exposure in their non-clinical roles, such as, but not limited to, environmental services, patient transport, or interpretation.

 Residents of skilled nursing facilities, assisted living facilities, and similar long-term care settings for older or medically subgrable individuals.

Recommendation B: Subprioritization During Phase 1a

During Phase 1a, if there are not enough doses of COVID-19 vaccine for all who choose to receive them, then
health department should subprioritize doses as needed to match the level of available supplies in a
sequential fashion using the following ranked categories:

o Persons exposed though work in health care or long-term care settings, by:

- 1. Type of facility or role
- 2. Location of facility
- 3. Attributes of individuals
- Health departments may reprioritize temporarily under limited circumstances described in Recommendation C.

Recommendation B1: Subprioritization by type of facility or role

- If supplies are limited during Phase 1a, COVID-19 vaccines should be directed to as many tiers, and
 categories in each tier (e.g., hospitals) as possible to reach the prioritized populations.
- The tiers and categories in each tier are presented in ranked order.
- Persons immunizing the prioritized populations in a tier should be of ered immunization during or before
 the same tier.


We coordinate and allocate vaccine to various entities within the countywith **safety, transparency and equity** as our guiding principles.

We make decisions about how much vaccine to allocate to various entities throughout the county; then those entities (e.g. hospitals, long term care facilities) often have their own prioritization decisions to make about which of their staff/residents they prioritize for the vaccine.

California Department of Public Health provided thorough recommendations for factors to consider when sub-prioritizing members within each priority group.

We also factor logistical and operational constraints, as each entity needs to have the right permissions, licenses, equipment, and staffing to be able to administer vaccine.







Ensuring equitable distribution of the vaccine

As we learn the timeline and federal and state guidance on the approach for distribution to the general public, we expect to tailor the outreach and the distribution strategy to assure reaching the most vulnerable communities, acknowledging the troubling history of health care research in communities of color. For community-wide vaccine distribution, we have developed a seven-point framework to guide our overall approach:

- 1) Provide transparency in the science and vaccination process.
- 2) Prioritize those that shoulder the most risk.
- 3) Acknowledge explicitly the negative and painful history of health care in the US in communities of color that has led to distrust in healthcare, research, and government.
- 4) Engage community and stakeholders to better understand their concerns and needs.
- 5) Respond to concerns and needs as much as possible.
- 6) Communicate effectively in culturally sensitive ways through trusted partners.
- 7) Learn and improve as we go.
